SIXTY-FIVE CENTS IS COST TEAM READY FOR FRAY

Mr. Temple was the star witness this morning in the state court hearing before the state judicial commission, held in the rooms of the Commercial association, and during the course of most interesting evidence gave exact figures on the cost of production of Umatilla county wheat, relates the East Oregonian of Pendleton. According to Mr. Temple, figuring in the cost of interest on the investment and a deterioration of the equipment, it costs 6 cents per bushel to produce the grain in this county, and his statement was borne out by two sets of figures, showing the cost of the production of grain under the hiring and the personal labor systems of farming, respectively.

Other prominent farmers, representing the several different grain raising districts of the county, were present and gave estimates in the cost of production running between 35 and 65 cents per bushel. The former estimate included simply the barest details of the cost, while the latter was elaborated in the consideration of every item of possible expense.

A football rally tonight will close the program activities in this city, and tomorrow the special contest of the season will be given at the ball park at 2:30 o'clock. Good Practice Last Night
The line of the regular team showed good plunging spirit last night in a fast practice game with the second team, and fairly ripped and tore the little fellows "gally west." La Grande's ends are especially strong, and The Observer can easily predict that the Pendletonians will make but few gains around the ends. Coach Wall has been informed that Pendleton's style of ground gaining is principally on short end runs, and he has framed up a defense for that line of attack that is a crackerjack, and the way the little fellows of the local team bust up interferences on trick plays and formations for end skirtings, is a pleasing feature of the training.

Demonstration Tonight
A rally of the red blood type is planned for tonight and when the streets resound with euphonic songs or ear-splitting yells, as the case may be, it will not be a Chinese riot, but high school rally—one that instills confidence in player and supporters alike.

Wire Around Grounds
With fences about the ground to keep the spectators off, and foreign officials to run the game, tomorrow's contest will be void of unpleasant features. The instructions to the officials will be to penalize the home team when crowds surge out on the field of play and any ungentlemanly conduct by any player either visiting or local, will result in that player's expulsion. These rules will be rigidly enforced, and if the over-enthusiastic rooters bring punishment on the home team, they do it knowing that it is contrary to field rules and book rules.

PIONEER RAILROADER DEAD.

One of the Early Conductors on N. P. and O. R. & N.
Martin V. Fletcher, a pioneer conductor on the Pasco-Dayton run of the Northern Pacific, died yesterday morning at the Walla Walla hospital, of intestinal troubles, says the Walla Walla Union. Mr. Fletcher was born in Norfolk, Va., April 26, 1858, and came to this coast at the age of 19 years. He had been employed on the Dayton-Pasco run since the year 1880 and was one of the most widely known railroad men in the northwest. The popularity of Mr. Fletcher is attested by a host of friends among traveling men and men employed by both the O. R. & N. and the Northern Pacific roads.

LOCAL OPTION IN COURT

Pendleton, Nov. 5.—Local option came up for discussion in the supreme court this afternoon, when the case of Guernsey and Cart vs. R. R. McHaley, county judge of Grant county, was called. The case is an action to prevent prohibition in that county and the appeal is taken by the liquor dealers from the decision of the lower court which held that the order should have been issued.

Following the prohibition case the court considered that of the State vs. Dougherty, the Morrow county murder case which is being appealed by Judge Fox and S. B. Van Vactor, attorneys for the defendant. Dougherty is the lone saloon man who shot Alvin Karpis in a saloon brawl at that place because he would not treat the robber.

This morning's session of the court was devoted to the argument in the case of W. G. Ayre vs. Hixon & Ames and Brasfield Bros., a foreclosure suit from Baker county.

J. P. Neal of Freewater, law partner of Homer I. Watts, and former classmate of that attorney, was admitted to practice on probation this morning by the court, upon presentation of his certificate of admission to the Indiana bar.
