### WHITMAN GAME TODAY.

Strong Team From Idaho Invades Whitman College Territory.

Walla Walla, Nov. 5.—Coach Blanchard last night put his men through the last hard scrimmage before the Whitman-Idaho game which is to be called on Ankeny field tomorrow afternoon.
