EAT PRIZES FOR ESSAYS

Portland, Nov. 7.—(Special)—The Oregon Society of the Sons of the American Revolution offers prizes to the pupils of the public schools of the state of Oregon, for essays on subjects of their own choosing, for independence.

Prizes of \$20 and \$10 will be awarded for the first and second best essays written by high school pupils on either one of the following subjects:

1. Foreign Aid in the Revolutionary War.
2. Washington's Greatness; in What Did It Consist?

Prizes of \$20, \$10 and three of \$5 each will be awarded for the first, second, third, fourth and fifth best essays, respectively, written by grade pupils on any one of the following subjects:

1. The Causes of the Revolutionary War.
2. The Battle of Saratoga.
3. The Navy in the Revolutionary War.
4. The Battle of Bunker Hill.

The essays are limited to 3000 words each, must be written in the student's own handwriting on one side only of the paper, and accompanied by a certificate from the writer's teacher, stating that the writer is a pupil in a designated class, and that the teacher believes the essay to be the pupil's own unaided work.

The essays must be signed by the writer, giving also his or her postoffice address. They should be forwarded to B. A. Thaxter, chairman of committee, 443 Eleventh street, Portland, Oregon, and should reach their destination not later than January 31, 1909.

In awarding these prizes the committee will be governed by considerations of:

1. Originality.
2. Accuracy of statement.
3. Manner of treatment.
4. Orthography, syntax and punctuation.
5. Neatness and legibility.

These prizes are offered to encourage love of our country and the study of its history.

On the last page of this leaflet will be found a list of books that will be helpful to students in collecting material for their essays.

Any additional information which may be desired will be cheerfully furnished on application to the chairman of the committee.

ALDRICH IS SIXTY-SEVEN.

Republican "Boss" of Senate is Nearing End of Career.

Providence, R. I., Nov. 6.—Nelson Wilmath Aldrich, senator from Rhode Island, and republican "boss" of the upper house of the national legislature, is today receiving the congratulations of friends on his 67th birthday. The senator took advantage of the occasion to reiterate his intention

of retiring from public life when his term expires, March 8, 1911. He will then be 70 years of age, and he declares that the weight of advancing years is responsible for his determination to step off the stage.

As a matter of fact, Senator Aldrich is preparing to give up his position because congress is becoming more and more non-partisan. Each session it becomes more difficult to control and whip into line the unwieldy republican majority of the senate.

In recent years there has been a great influx of young men, and these young men are following their own ambitions. Aldrich realizes that his power as the great and only tactical leader of the senate is waning.

Senator Aldrich was born in Foster, R. I., November 6, 1841, and after receiving an academic education, engaged in mercantile pursuits. He became a member of the Rhode Island legislature in 1875 and its speaker in the following year. He was elected to congress for the terms of 1879-1883, but resigned to take his seat in the senate, where he has since been prominent and of late years the admitted leader. He is the father-in-law of John D. Rockefeller, Jr., son of the head of the oil trust, and this family connection has often led to charges that he has unduly favored the Standard Oil company and other big corporations.
