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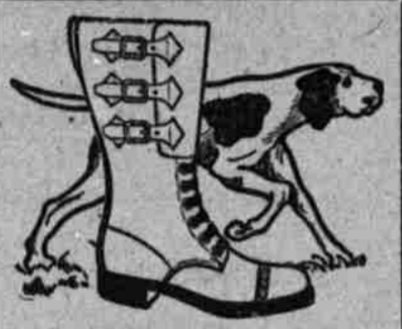

WANT HELP FOR NEEDY

ANNUAL CALL FOR HELP BY BOYS & GIRLS' AID SOCIETY.

Portland Institution Which is Taking Care of Several Union County Children, Pleads for Thanksgiving Offering—Brief Report of the School.

The work of the Boys & Girls' Aid society in Portland, has become so well known throughout the state of Oregon, that it is almost needless to give any detailed account of it, but for the information of those who do not know, a few extracts from the last annual report of the society may be interesting, writes the superintendent to The Observer. During the fiscal year just past the society received 373 children. These were on hand at the receiving home at Portland the first of the year 55, thus making the total number of children 428. Out of this number 47 were found places to work for wages, 158 were placed in family homes where they received their clothes, board and schooling; 32 were placed out for legal adoption; 31 were returned to parents or relatives; 33 were sent to other institutions, and 12 were discharged, having come of age; making the total number disposed of 375, thus leaving on hand at the receiving home the first of the year 53. Out of the number received during the year there were 297 new cases, of which 131 were boys and 166 girls. The average of the girls was 10.7, and the average age of the boys 9.3. The following counties contributed to this number: Baker 5, Benton 5, Clackamas 3, Clatsop 1, Columbia 1, Coos 1, Crook 2, Wouglas 6, Jackson 1, Josephine 2, Klamath 2, Lane 12, Linn 5, Malheur 2, Marion 6, Multnomah 117, Sherman 3, Tillamook 5, Union 2, Umatilla 5, Wallowa 2, Wasco 5, Washington 9, Yamhill 6.

The work of the Boys & Girls' Aid society is now bearing fruit. Superintendent Gardner says that they receive quite a number of letters and visits from children who were once in their care, but who have now become of age, and these visits are very pleasant, as it shows that in many cases the children turn out to be good and useful citizens, who otherwise would be a care and expense to the community.

The donations from the public schools of the state and from private citizens makes it possible for the management to care for the children who come under its guardianship in the most economical manner and also feed and clothe them perhaps better than any other institution in the state, and the society now appeals to all those who have the welfare of dependent children at heart to subscribe toward this excellent institution this Thanksgiving. Money, provisions of all kinds, fruit, vegetables, or indeed anything that is of use in a household, is very acceptable. The railroad companies and steamboats have kindly consented to dead-head all donations sent to the society at Thanksgiving, if plainly marked "Boys & Girls' Aid Society, Portland, Oregon." All communications should be addressed to the superintendent, W. T. Gardner.

The receiving home is on the East Ankeny car line and the management earnestly invites all interested persons to visit the institution at any time. All its workings are open to the inspection of interested persons. If you want a boy or girl to raise, apply as above.
