TAKE BODY TO JOSEPH

The body of W. T. Bunnell, who last Sunday afternoon threw himself in front of a train near Walla Walla and met almost instant death, arrived at La Grande this morning on the Joseph for interment. The following dispatch from Walla Walla recites the manner of death:

W. T. Bunnell, aged 35 years, a laborer who has been employed on the Fred Stine ranch, six miles from Walla Walla, was struck by an O. R. & N. train yesterday afternoon about 2 o'clock, near the Spofford warehouse between Walla Walla and Milton, where he had laid down on the track apparently with suicidal intent. When picked up by the train crew he was still alive, though the entire top of his head was split open, while his chin was badly cut and his right hand mashed. He was brought to this city on the train and quickly conveyed to St. Mary's hospital, where he died at 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon, never regaining consciousness. Ill luck and despondency over the breaking up of his home through the death of his wife is supposed to have caused him to commit suicide, although he left no word or note.

The engineer on the train which ran down Bunnell said he saw a dark object lying on the track a considerable distance ahead of him, but thinking it a pig, merely blew the whistle and did not slacken speed until he was almost on the object, who was too late. That the body was not decapitated would seem to indicate that the front wheels of the locomotive had struck the head and brushed it from the track.

GIRL INJURED

Martha Morrill, 15-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ed Morrill of Kamela, fell last evening while returning from school and sustained a severe break of the right arm near the elbow. Suffering intense pain, the little girl was brought to La Grande on the east-bound and treated by Dr. Hubbard. The break is so serious that the arm may never perfectly heal, but remain stiff and inactive. The little girl returned to her home on the late train.

GREAT BOON FOR TACOMA

HILL TO AID IN THE BUILDING UP FACILITIES.

Mercantile Interests Seize Opportunity to Aid Hill in His Decision and Fight Opposition From City Council in Not Allowing Road a Franchise.

Tacoma, Nov. 10.—The mercantile organizations of the city renewed their efforts today to overcome the opposition displayed by the city council to allowing the Great Northern railroad to enter Tacoma. Hill announced yesterday that the Great Northern is ready and willing to enter Tacoma, and will aid in building the Grand Central depot to equal any in the west. The proposition of the road is to come from Seattle over the Northern Pacific tracks, and build modern yards, and freight houses on land purchased from the Northern Pacific road, which is also a Hill road.
