READY FOR TEACHERS

BAKER CITY TO BE LIBERAL HOST.

Large Attendance Expected From Union County, When Eastern Oregon Teachers' Association Meets in Baker City—Long Program Prepared.

Baker City, Nov. 11.—The Herald said last night:

With the belief that nothing is too good for the women and men who devote their lives to teaching the young of the state of Oregon, Baker City is going to try and outdo all former efforts in the way of entertainment when the State Teachers' association meets here November 23, 24 and 25.

Besides the regular program, which is filled with the best possible to obtain in the way of lectures, music, etc., there will be a football game between Salem and Baker high schools, which promises to be one of the exciting games of the year.

The sessions of the association will be held in the Pythian castle on Washington and Second street. The O. R. & N. railroad has given an excursion rate for the Baker meeting and County Superintendent Smith states that in his opinion there will be at least 400 teachers present.

Already preparations are on foot in La Grande and all Union county, in fact, for general attendance at these meetings. The event is one annually attended by as many teachers as possible. As yet no definite statement can be made relative to the number to go from this county, but it will reach 50 at least, is the common belief.

SPEAKS FOR MR. SCRIBER

NOT YET DECIDED THAT HE WILL PLEAD GUILTY.

The Question as to Whether or Not His Relatives Will Make Up the Losses to the Depositors, Will Hang on the Matter of Mitigating His Sentence—In Case He Should Enter a Plea and Throw Himself on the Mercy of the Court.

Mr. McMahan, J. W. Scriber's attorney, said this morning that in all probability Scriber's friends and relatives would make an effort in the near future to make good the banker's shortage, which has been estimated at \$125,000. If this is to be done it will be with the hopes of mitigating sentence of the court in even that Scriber decides to plead guilty to the charge. Mr. McMahan, who is acting as Scriber's attorney, said that as yet it has not been decided whether Scriber will plead guilty and ask for clemency or fight the case which the government is to prosecute.

Scriber will remain in Portland until he is wanted in La Grande to assist those in charge of the bank's affairs in straightening out the situation. Mr. McMahan said that the reports of threats to lynch the banker were without foundation and that Scriber would return to his home town at the proper time. The attorney also said that Scriber's friends and relatives had no fear of his committing suicide.—Portland Journal.
