EXPERIMENT WITH WHISTLE.

Fire Alarm System Not Yet Perfected as Siren Has Been Discarded.

The O. R. & N. was today making experiments with the new steamboat whistle—not a siren—on the power house in the railroad yards, that is to soon serve as a fire alarm system, if it works out favorably. A siren arrived some time ago for this purpose but was deemed impractical. Now the company has attached a large steamboat whistle, that will, if serviceable, blast out warnings of fire by a system of codes, easily committed to memory and one that will inform the public as nearly as possible the exact nature of the danger.

Numerous experiments were made with the whistle today, but it did not prove entirely satisfactory. It is barely possible that the siren may yet be adopted.

It is the purpose of the fire and water committee of the council to place electric alarm appliances at the city hall and at the Home Independent Telephone office. When these are installed, and the best whistle for the purpose decided upon, full announcement of the code and alarm system will be announced.

RUMORS ARE GENERAL.
