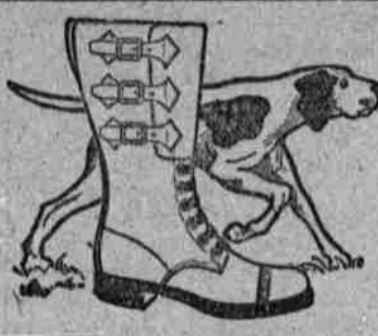

Cove, Nov. 11.—Surveyors have been at work during the past week, platting the upper portion of the old McDaniel place in Cove.

It is reported that this ground is to be devoted to the raising of strawberries, while that lying just east will be cleared of old buildings, etc., and be cut into town lots.
