BOOK REVIEW.

Last week the Saturday Evening Post contained the opening chapters of a story by Robert W. Chambers. The story is finished this week. The ending, of course, is just what everybody expected it to be. We mention the story only because the thread on which it hangs is so slender—ethereal—so to speak. But both installments, in which a girl, a man and a cat figure, are amusing.

Collier's for two weeks in succession, has published a \$1000 prize story, both of especial interest to the newspaper fraternity. The first one, in the November 7 number, is not remarkable, being a slender clue, based on the usual subject of a baffling mystery, and a sharp reporter who makes a big "scoop." Reporters have at times been suspected of making big stories out of nothing at all. In the current number of Collier's however, the prize story is full of heart interest, and well worth one's while. This periodical, by the way, aspires to be the "National Weekly," and may fairly lay claim to the title, at least in comparison with any other publication. This week they cover quite a range of subjects, from editorial discussion of the plague measures taken by San Francisco, to articles on the work of Dr. Parkhurst of New York, and John D. Rockefeller of the same town. Mr. Rockefeller is trying to counteract the evil impressions that have gone out against him during his somewhat long and very active money-gathering career.

PENDLETON GETS DEPOT.

Sister City Secures Idea of What New Structure is to Be Like.

Pendleton gets a new \$24,000 depot, according to the announcement made by Vice-President and General Manager J. P. O'Brien of the O. R. & N., to a committee of representative business men here this morning. In addition, if satisfactory arrangements can be made by the company, a change in the location of the round house and other yard equipment will make a total expenditure of \$45,000 in the local yards, says the Pendleton East Oregonian.

Mr. O'Brien's announcement was received with welcome by the local committee, consisting of President Alexander of the Commercial club, and Messrs. Leon Cohen, C. E. Roosevelt, Thomas Taylor, G. M. Rice, M. B. Gwinn, William L. Thompson, Will Moore and Louis Hunziker. The railroad officials were assured of every possible help upon the part of Pendleton.

The building planned is of a type of architecture common enough among stations, but will be a little gem in its construction and appointments. It will be constructed of concrete block, with wide projecting eaves, and a roof projection at either end. The roof of the building will be of slate. Under the roof projections at the ends, seats will be placed, and these will become popular waiting places when the weather will permit. Low dormers will project from the roof on either side.

Special Election to Approve Charter Amendments

Notice is hereby given that on Tuesday, the 24th day of November, 1928, a special election will be held of the voters of the City of La Grande, Union county, Oregon, and that the polls will be open from the hour of 9 o'clock a. m., until the hour of five o'clock p. m., of said day.

Said election is called by order of the Council of the City of La Grande for the purpose of proposing and submitting to the people of the City of La Grande the approval and adoption of certain amendments to the charter of the city of La Grande as shown by the proposed charter heretofore approved by the council of the City of La Grande by ordinance No. 392, Series 1928, and filed with, and in the office of the recorder of the city of La Grande, on the 10th day of September, 1928.

The approval of these amendments by the people of the city of La Grande will be submitted to the voters on the following proposition:

Shall the City of La Grande amend its charter and approve the amendments to the city charter, and the new city charter proposed and submitted by the council to the people of the city of La Grande?

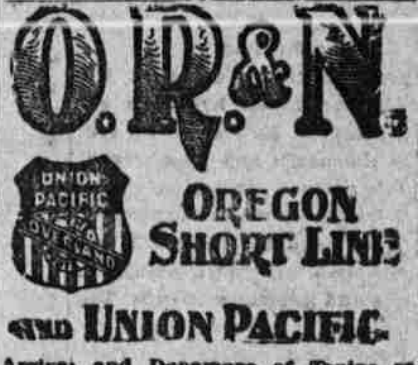
