Hurrah for Pendleton. She is to have a \$24,000 concrete depot building. This means the beginning for improved depot facilities all along the line where needed. La Grande and Baker City will undoubtedly be similarly favored. The comparison with the depot buildings in Idaho and Oregon are not favorable to the Beaver state and it is noticeable immediately upon leaving our state eastbound, or entering westbound. Superintendent Buckley a few weeks ago stated while in La Grande that in due time La Grande would have a depot building in keeping with her commercial importance and requirements. Something is expected during the next season.

Eugene has launched a campaign for a \$50,000 Y. M. C. A. building. It has been under consideration for the past three years, and is now to be perfected. Through the possible co-operation of the C. R. & N. Co., such an institution could be secured for La Grande. The idea has been talked over by a few of our people, but has never been investigated to see if such co-operation could be secured. It is worthy of an effort.

The northwest is doing a tremendous amount of advertising. Think of it. hundreds of cities are expending from \$1000 to \$50,000 in advertising their respective resources and the east is being flooded with descriptive matter. The result is that the wild and woolly west idea is being eradicated, and we are known more in our true light.

The sheriff's office in Klamath county is at least making an attempt to enforce the local option law. Saturday more than 20 arrests were made which is the beginning of a definite program of law enforcement. It is given out that a large amount of evidence has been accumulated and each of the defendants will have to stand trial on several counts.

Umatilla county is not going to secure the proposed experiment station for eastern Oregon without opposition. Gilliam county proposes to show that within her borders is the only place where it should be located. The irrigation features of Umatilla county may aid her when the time for decision arrives.

The state irrigation congress meets next month in Baker City. There should be a large delegation from Union county. We as a people have much to learn regarding the benefits of irrigation. If we did we would not be permitting our present 20,000-acre project drag as it is.

The woolgrowers of Umatilla county are standatters on the tariff. They are organizing with a view of letting good enough alone from their standpoint remain.

HAVE 100 BOXES.

Display for Seattle Fair is Being Assembled in Union County.

One hundred and sixty boxes of choice apples have been selected by William Hall to be sent to the Seattle fair by the Commercial club. The matter is being attended to with all possible dispatch, as the display must be in cold storage at Seattle early this season, to be properly considered as an

exhibit when the World's fair opens next spring. It is planned by the La Grande Commercial club to have the other commercial bodies of the county supply about 50 boxes of choice apples, bringing the grand total of boxes from Union county to 200.

The several clubs are now working on this line. It is also planned to ask the county court for a small appropriation to cover expenses of sending the exhibit. Union county cannot afford to be carelessly represented at the coming fair, and it is taken for granted the county will provide for incidental expenses.
