PORTLAND NEWS LETTER.

Portland Correspondent Sends Out a "Newspaper" Letter.

Portland, Nov. 16.—(Special correspondence.)—Interest in the joint meeting of the State Horticultural society and the Northwest Fruitgrowers' association is universal throughout this part of the United States and British Columbia. The State association holds a convention in Portland Tuesday, December 1. This is followed by two days' meeting of the Northwest association. Convention and exhibit will occupy two floors of the Woodmen's hall, Eleventh and Alder streets. A night session will be held in the convention room on Tuesday, and a reception will be tendered to the delegates to both conventions on Thursday evening, December 3, by the Portland Commercial club from 8 to 11 o'clock. The prizes for this show are very much the most valuable ever offered and an enormous attendance is anticipated.

The Albany Apple fair occupied the center of the stage in Oregon activities last week. Albany gave Portland, Eugene and Salem an object lesson in entertaining that it will take these cities a long time to equal. The town is growing and building hard surface pavements, while apples shown were equal to the best.

The Oregon State Dairy association has been recognized by the Agricultural department at Washington, D. C., and assurance is given that government experts will participate in the convention on December 10 and 11 at Salem. A rate of a fare and a third for the round trip has been made from all points in the state.

Klickitat county's citizens joined in a monster optimistic rally at White Salmon, Wash., last Saturday. Expert publicity men and railroad officials were present from Portland to take part in the event, which was one of the most successful ever held in the Evergreen State.

In line with the general railroad development of this northwestern country was the completion of the railroad from Elgin to Enterprise, which affords an easy market for the Walla Walla valley. The final terminus will be Joseph.

No more interesting talk was ever made before the Port Ad club than the address delivered by Dr. W. T. Williamson on "Suggestion the Chief Force in Advertising." Members and their friends filled the hall.

UNIVERSITY NOTES.

La Grande Boy Has Regular Guard Position on U. of O. Seconds.

University of Oregon, Nov. 15.—(Special.)—"Commonwealth Day" may be added to the list of events on the calendar of the University of Oregon. The plan is to set apart a day in the latter part of June of each year upon which day all of the public men of the state, including legislators, editors and all other persons who are the servants of the people in any capacity, shall be the guests of the university. The university, with its special equipment, is often able to be of great service to people throughout the state in the way of furnishing information, data and working out problems of various sorts. The idea is to get the leading men of the state into close touch with the work at the university and to show them how their state institutions or agencies may benefit therefrom.

The three state universities of Idaho, Washington and Oregon will debate the income tax question on the 26th day of next March. James K. Neill of La Grande, is now playing regularly at right guard in the second football team. The university hopes to have a

semi-weekly student paper before the close of the present college year.
