Billek Legally Dead.
Chicago, Nov. 16.—That Herman Billek, the Bohemian hypnotist and fortune teller who was convicted of the murder of several members of the Vrsal family, is legally dead, is the novel plea to be made by Attorney Hineckly before Judge Barnes in an attempt to save Billek from the gallows when the court convenes to pronounce sentence on the "evil-eye" poisoner tomorrow. Billek was sentenced to be hanged last summer. The day of execution came, but the United States court took a hand in the case and Billek was given leave to appeal to the supreme court of the United States. That court found that it had no jurisdiction and the case came back to Judge Barnes for re-sentence. It is now claimed that in the absence of any order rescinding or postponing the previous sentence of death, Billek, in legal theory, is already dead, and hence can not be sentenced to pay any penalty whatsoever. It is not considered likely that this plea will be upheld by the court, and it is highly probable that the arch-poisoner will again be sentenced to be hanged by the neck until dead. Catholic priests and sisters have been active in attempting to prove Billek's innocence, but while their efforts have tended to discredit some of the evidence adduced at the trial, it has not been sufficient to remove Billek from the shadow of the gallows.

New Stamps on Sale.
Washington, Nov. 16.—Uncle Sam's new issue of postage stamps was placed on sale today at many postoffices, but the demand has been so great that some offices will still sell the old series until the supply is exhausted. Stamp books containing the new stamps have been sent to all the larger offices and will be on sale today. The denominations of the new stamps, which are officially known as the "series of 1908," are of 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 8, 10, 13, 15 and 50 cents, and \$1. The postoffice department says that \$2 and \$5 stamps will be discontinued after the present supply is exhausted. On the one-cent stamp is the head of Benjamin Franklin in profile from Houdon's bust. All the other denominations bear the head of George Washington in profile from Houdon's bust. The border designs of all the denominations are identical, the head being an ellipse on end with laurel leaves on either side. Above the head are the words "U. S. Postage," below it the denomination. The size of the stamp is the same as that of the stamps formerly on sale.
