TO DISCUSS CURRENCY

TURN COIN TO PORTLAND

PRELIMINARY MEETING OF NATIONAL CONVENTION TODAY.

No Bankers Will Sit in Convention to Juggle National Currency Issues—What Suggestions Will Be Made by This Convention Will Be Recommended to Congress.

New York, Nov. 18.—A preliminary meeting of a National Currency convention, composed of delegates from leading commercial organizations of the entire country, was commenced in New York today. No bankers are allowed to sit in the convention. Each large city in the country has representation. The purpose of today's meeting is to arrange the details for a national currency convention of commercial interests to be held before the 61st congress begins its labors.

That reform in the nation's currency system is urgently needed was recognized at the last session of congress and a special commission was appointed to recommend changes that could be adopted and which would prevent a tightness of money such as experienced a year ago. The purpose of the currency convention is to get the views of the business men of the country on the subject.

When the Chamber of Commerce of Pittsburg inaugurated the movement for this convention the bankers of the country were purposely excluded from it. The real intention was to secure the opinion of the men engaged in industrial and commercial pursuits and these will be obtained at the convention. This convention will make recommendations of changes to the existing currency laws and these will be submitted to the congressional commission, with a request that they be carried into effect.
