As usual La Grande will be far the lighter team of the two aggregations. But it must be admitted that the locals are coached to a higher degree of efficiency, and despite what be said to the contrary, will show the rooster that it has much better endurance than the muscular and hard-working members of the Cove team.

Harry Walters, the hard-playing "go-get-'em" individual of the past in Island City's career, will figure conspicuously on the field at that time under Cove's colors.

Notice is hereby given that on Tuesday, the 24th day of November, 1908, a special election will be held of the voters of the City of La Grande, Union county, Oregon, and that the polls will be open from the hour of 9 o'clock a. m., until the hour of five o'clock p. m., of said day.

Said election is called by order of the Council of the City of La Grande for the purpose of proposing and submitting to the people of the City of La Grande the approval and adoption of certain amendments to the charter of the city of La Grande as shown by the proposed charter heretofore approved by the council of the City of La Grande by ordinance No. 282, Series 1908, and filed with, and in the office of the recorder of the city of La Grande, on the 10th day of September, 1908.

The approval of these amendments by the people of the city of La Grande will be submitted to the voters on the following proposition:

Shall the City of La Grande amend its charter and approve the amendments to the city charter, and the new city charter proposed and submitted by the council to the people of the city of La Grande?
