ROCKEFELLER AGAIN ON STAND.

Memory Fails the Old King of Oil Trust in Gruelling Examination.

New York, Nov. 23.—John D. Rockefeller was on the stand again today in the government's suit for the dissolution of the Standard Oil company of New Jersey. He was more stubborn than ever in reply to "Trust Buster" Kellogg's questions. He refused to give the names of stockholders in 1874 and failed to learn the names of the capitalists whose businesses were swallowed up by the trust. As shown by the president of the Erie railroad and three directors of the Lake Shore road connected with the Standard prior to 1872.

At the beginning Rockefeller answered a few questions, but soon assumed an obstructive attitude and used every means of defeating the attorney's object.

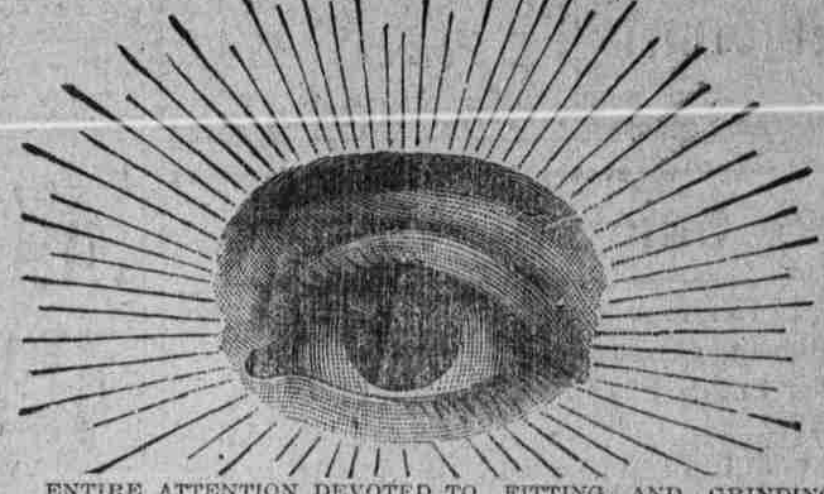
