The following selection is taken from the editorial page of the "Grange Echoes," W. R. Gekeler, editor-in-chief:

The Evolution of the "Hayseed."
 For ages the evolution of the formation of the earth continued. Stratum after stratum of the geological column were laid down. The cycle of the world, flora and fauna continued until the quaternary period of the Cenozoic era, when the Almighty Creator of our being saw fit to place man on earth. In the worldly paradise, the exact spot lost to history, He placed the first man, a farmer.

Agricultural toilers therefore claim this procedure over royal dynasties of titled nobility; that they represent the oldest and most indisputable lineage and hold a patent that issues from the ancient gates of Eden. Before government existed, before the cities were founded, or before the lamp of literature was ignited; agriculture was the calling of man. History proves that where agriculture has been fostered the nation has attained the highest point of perfection. This is true in all early nations, who each in turn held supremacy. In the rise of "Imperial Rome" the Patricians held and worked their estates in the country and ruled the world until the coming of the Caesars.

In America, the first successful English colonies were those who came to make homes and till the soil. The sturdy forefathers cleared their little homes under the ravages of the hostile redmen, raised their corn and tobacco, with which they purchased a wife and began this mighty nation. When the mother country became unbearably oppressive to the colonies, it was the tillers of the brown earth who came forward to fight for liberty and under the supervision of the farmers, Washington, Putnam, Jefferson, Marlton and Allen, they organized the first "Hayseed Band."

The American farmer is the most independent of all classes of people. If all the cities in the country were wiped out of existence the farmer could continue the same, but on the other hand, if the farmer should disappear, the cities would immediately cease to exist. In looking over the annals of the United States history, we find that one-fourth of the men who have attained world-wide reputations in either national affairs or in literature, are products of the rural communities. Today the farmer boys and girls who live up to the backbone of "Mother Nature," are in great demand. Not only does the farm call for their aid, but all positions of trust in the United States are calling for the stalwart country "Rube," and

when the inhabitants of the city wake to see the independence of the farmer and how they are surpassed by the rustic country youth, the ridicule of the old "Homestead" will cease and the farmer will come to his own: "The power behind the throne."
