JOHN D. OFF THE STAND

ARCHBOLD WILL BE THE NEXT STANDARD WITNESS.

Rockefeller on Stand for Last Time in Severe Grilling Administered by Kellogg—Archbold to Complete Narrative.

New York, Nov. 24.—John D. Rockefeller today faced Attorney Kellogg for his final grilling in the government suit to dissolve the Standard in New Jersey. It is probable that Archbold, the vice-president, will be the next witness. The latter may take up the story where Rockefeller left off at the period of development in 1882, and carry the narrative to the present date.

Kellogg will use his previous testimony of Archbold before the congressional committee and other bodies in his effort to confuse the jury shown in the accounts of Rockefeller. Archbold did not agree on important points. Kellogg today took up the investigation of the assets of stock distributed to him by the Standard Oil Co. He asked a number of questions along that line.

THOSE WHO MAY BE ASSESSED

For the first time since the closing of the doors of the Farmers & Traders National bank, has it been possible to secure a list of the stockholders, which is still more interesting to the numerous depositors since the stockholders have been assessed 100 per cent, made payable December 19. While The Observer does not present this as coming officially for such is not the case, but the list contains few errors. Those who are in touch with the conditions are of the opinion that the amount so received from this assessment will be somewhere between \$15,000 and \$18,000. Mr. Ackles, Mrs. Hassett and J. H. Rinehart claim that they sold their stock, but that the same was not transferred on the books. Some of the others are not financially responsible for the amounts and there are some estates which are considered questionable as being liable.
