The supreme court has handed down its decision in the case of the State of Oregon vs. R. W. Deal, who was convicted of horse stealing in this county. He was tried in Pendleton where he secured a change of venue from this county. He was sentenced to serve three years in the penitentiary. From this he appealed to the supreme court, asking for a new trial. This has been denied and within the next few weeks the mandate will be received from the clerk of the court remanding him into the hands of the sheriff, to be taken to the penitentiary.

Washington, D. C., Nov. 25.—Lieutenant Philip Sheridan, son of the illustrious union general of the civil war, today unveiled the massive statue erected here to the memory of his father.
