#### FOUR MORE MODERN CARS

Beginning next Tuesday, four com-  
posite observation cars will be added  
to the equipment of the Overland Lim-  
ited trains between Portland and  
Green River, giving the Portland trav-  
eling public identical service with San  
Francisco on the through trains and  
Portland has only through cars,  
which are hooked on and off at Green  
River Junction, as the case may be,  
says a Portland paper.

Word was received from the O. R.  
& N. officials from the main Harriman  
offices in Chicago, announcing that the  
four handsome electrically lighted cars  
would leave Chicago one day begin-  
ning next Saturday, and be put in  
service at Green River as soon as they  
arrive at that point. The first one will  
pass through La Grande Tuesday  
morning and will arrive in Portland  
on Overland No. 1 next Tuesday night,  
and the first one will leave Portland  
Wednesday morning on Overland Lim-  
ited No. 2. The cars bear very odd  
names, having been christened after  
certain mountain peaks in Scotland,  
as follows: Benlomond, Bealder, Ben-  
evis and Belomond, the only differ-  
ence being the name consists of  
out the one word.

The addition of these observation  
cars is made for the purpose of meet-  
ing the class of service which the  
North Bank road has been giving  
since that line was opened, and will  
mean "daylight" observation cars on  
the O. R. & N. up and down the Co-  
lumbia. It is understood that the  
request for the new equipment was  
not made by the local officials until  
on the very eve of the opening of the  
Hill road and that the cars were or-  
dered immediately.

Washington, Nov. 23.—Final plans  
have been made by the navy depart-  
ment for the dispatch of the fleet on  
its homeward voyage from Manila to  
Hampton Roads. According to the it-

and arrive at Colombo, Ceylon, Decem-  
ber 14. After coaling at Colombo, the

celebration on board all the vessels,
