# ATTEND TO MANY THINGS OF IMPORT

## CANNERY AND COFFIN PROPOSITIONS STUDIED.

Urge Vancouver Cannery Man to Come to La Grande Personally—His Proposition is Plausible—Also Point Out Facilities and Resources Existing Here for Coffin and Casket Factory—Meeting of Club Board Last Evening a Fruitful One.

One of the busiest and no doubt most fruitful meetings of the La Grande Commercial club in many months was held last evening for the scope of work done and the matters attended to, was large. In the first place, the most tangible steps yet taken since the irrigation boom was launched resulted last evening, and in addition to that there was other business pertaining to the pending cannery and coffin factory which was given real and earnest attention.

**Bring Cannery Man Here.**  
The resume of business done as far as the cannery is concerned was to issue an urgent invitation to the Vancouver capitalist, who wishes to build and equip a cannery here, ranging in price from \$750 to \$11,000, before asking for a cent in subsidies, to come here. The club outlined the letter to be forwarded to him, affirming, of course, that the field here was highly suitable for a cannery, but extending above all other matters, an urgent invitation for him to come here personally, and go over the field. It is believed the man's presence will be the outcome of the letter. As stated in The Observer, this is the most plausible proposition in the cannery line yet put forth by outside capitalists.

**Good Coffin Country.**  
Referring—not to the death rate, but to the splendid resources—the club likewise sent an invitation to the South Carolina capitalist who wants to build and operate a coffin and casket factory in this city. The letter drafted by the club last night and to be forwarded to the southland, points out that there are two modern saw-mills within easy reach of the city to furnish the necessary material, and that the specie of fir trees that crown the hills about the city have no superior for that purpose in Oregon. Various other questions which the man asked were answered in full. Something will result from both of these propositions, is the feeling predominating among the club board.

## DELEGATES TO BAKER

Union county will be well represented at the state meeting of the Oregon Irrigation association at Baker City December 15. President Collier of the Commercial association, has appointed 10 delegates, and a larger percentage of them have signified their willingness to go.

The meeting will be an important one. It is of especial interest to eastern Oregon and the men who will go will learn irrigation facts that will stand them well in hand in their home county.

Those appointed to represent La Grande are J. D. McKennon, George Stoddard, J. E. Reynolds, J. L. Caviness, William Jasper, C. D. Huffman, Walter M. Pierce, F. J. Holmes, F. S. Bramwell and Turner Oliver. These men, with the exception of the last named, are the men who comprise the committees now redoubling their energies in fulfilling the purpose of the Eccles irrigation scheme.
