LOW RATE TO SPOKANE.

Apple Growers Accorded Cheap Rates to National Apple Show.

Trained Animal Show.

At the Scenic.

Patrons of the Scenic were somewhat disappointed last evening with the film entitled "Jerusalem," but their disappointment was not equal to that of Manager Gardiner. When you see it this evening try and figure out how the actors were made to "Hurry up." Mr. Cecil Summers will furnish a monologue turn this evening. There is enough for the money even if the spectators do not value the Jerusalem at all.

The Pastime.

The program will be the same as advertised for last evening. The feature bill is "Mary Stuart, Queen of Scots." This is a handsomely colored film and one which is historically correct.
