TROUBLE AT HERMISTON.

Old Feud Breaks Out Again and Factions Are Locking Horns.

There may have been peace at the last election in Hermiston, but it was the calm before the storm—the storm of legal battle which will break at the close of the Card divorce case in the district court today over the quo warranto proceeding brought by Attorney R. R. Johnson, acting for several prominent citizens of the irrigation town to knock out the incorporation of the city, says the Pendleton East Oregonian.

Mr. Johnson and District Attorney G. W. Phelps will represent the state in the proceedings, while F. H. Bartlett and R. J. Slater will defend the city and its officials. The complainants in the case will contend that the city was never legally incorporated, inasmuch as the action in granting the petition for incorporation was taken by the county judge, sitting as court with the county commissioners, whereas, so it is contended, the county judge alone should have passed upon and decided the merits of the incorporation petition.

Also, during the course of the proceedings, the plaintiff will probably bring up the question of the Hermiston election of a year ago, alleging it to have been fraudulent, and to have been conducted without regard to the election laws. On the other hand, the defense will contend that the city of Hermiston was legally and regularly organized, an election on the question of incorporation having been properly authorized, at which a majority of ballots cast were in favor of an incorporated town, and at which officers were duly and regularly elected.

A FALSE RUMOR.

Leo McCoy is in Spokane and Has Been for Several Weeks.

Reports have been current in this city for two weeks or more to the effect that Leo McCoy was a prisoner in Portland, charged with holding up and beating a man badly. Later the reports were freely circulated that the victim of the hold-up had died of his injuries. Last week while Sheriff Childers was passing through Portland he visited the county jail and went through the registry books and not being satisfied in not seeing his name, asked permission to go through the cells and personally see the prisoners. Leo McCoy was not there, neither was there any charge against him. This morning Leo writes his mother to the effect that he has been in Spokane for the past month. Leo's many friends here, as well as the friends of the family will be glad to learn that all of these reports have been without foundation. The error seemingly was caused by the report in the Portland papers of the arrest of the Leo McCoy, no relation or even acquaintance of Leo.
