HOLIDAY TRADE FINE

Portland, Dec. 28.—(Special correspondence.)—The greatest holiday trade ever enjoyed by Portland and the other cities and towns of Oregon, closed on the evening of December 24. It was estimated that there were exceeding 60,000 actual shoppers in the stores and about the streets of Portland at 4 o'clock Christmas eve. The entire downtown district was a mass of moving vehicles and pedestrians and the aisles of the larger retail houses were almost impassable.

The year 1909 will be the travel year for the Pacific northwest. The most advantageous rates are in this direction. All of the great railroads of the country are going to bend their efforts toward presenting the resources of this portion of the United States throughout the east, Canada and Europe. The Portland Rose show and the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific exposition will be two important features and railroad men in all the large centers of population predict an enormous travel.
