## KIDDLE BROTHERS ARE HEAVY SHIPPERS

FROM TWELVE TO FIFTEEN  
CARLOADS EACH MONTH.

Union County Has Changed—Days of Large Individual Bands, and Free Range is a Thing of the Past.

Kiddle brothers, who have been recognized as the heaviest shippers of stock in this county, are now averaging from 12 to 15 cars monthly. Union county is one of the largest and most diversified in the state, and while it has passed from the large holdings of former cattle kings, there is practically as many as under the former days of free range and large individual bands, but they are scattered throughout the valley on each and every farm, and buyers have little trouble in securing carload lots of hogs, cattle or horses, whenever they are willing to pay the market price.

The high prevailing price of grain this year resulted in fewer prime cattle, but Union county stock is always fat, owners are receiving practically the same prices as last year. Present prices are 5½¢ for hogs, 2½¢ for cows and 3½¢ for steers.

### Manager Brown Has New Job.

Robert Brown, manager of the Pendleton baseball team six years ago, has re-entered fandom and will now rule the destinies of the Spokane league baseball team of Spokane. Bobby Brown, as he was known, played with the Pendleton Indians when that aggregation won the pennant from Baker City, the Yellow Kids of Athena, Walla Walla and others in the league. 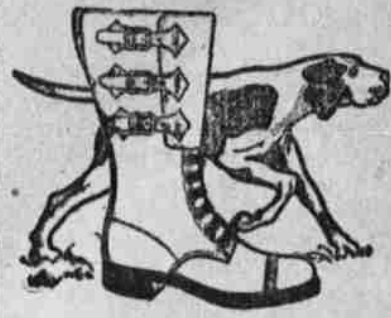
