MILTON MAN SUICIDES.

Married 20 Years and Attempts Suicide Seven Times Futilely.

Milton, Jan. 2.—After living with his wife for more than 20 years and after seven futile attempts to build up a home for his family, Henry Grady, a resident of the Milton neighborhood, becoming discouraged with life, committed suicide at his home at 10 o'clock on New Year's day by slashing his throat with a razor.

The slash made extended from ear to ear, the razor severing both jugular veins and making a ghastly wound, which resulted in his death a few hours later.

Immediately after the crime the wounded man tried to end also the life of his son, who was standing near. He was prevented from this deed by the mother, who seized the child and rushed him out of harm's way. Mrs. Grady, paralyzed with fear, hurried to a neighbor with the terrible tale, and returning to his assistance, found him where he had fallen across a chair, bleeding profusely. He was raised and carried to a lounge nearby, where he died later.

STILL IN BED.

As a Result of Christmas Football Game.

Through the persuasion of former schoolmates of the Pendleton academy, Benjamin Knapper, assistant cashier of the First National Bank of Joseph, was induced to participate with that school in its Christmas game of football with the La Grande high school at the latter place, and in the first half of the game he became injured internally, but finished the half. It was all he could do to get to Joseph on the train the following day and ever since he has been closely confined, most of the time to his bed, but is improving. He is at the home of his brother-in-law, Colonel R. Eberhard.—Joseph Herald.
