Every Commercial Club in the State Should Adopt Portland's Novel Plan—General Resume of Oregon's Industrial Growth the Past Week is Briefly Told.

Portland, Jan. 4.—(Special correspondence.)—The Portland Commercial club has introduced a novel feature that should be adopted by every community in Oregon. It is the appointment of a "Newcomers' special committee, and that committee held its first meeting Saturday, outlining a plan to be carried on throughout the entire year, which will result in giving each and every newcomer the "glad hand."

The apples of the Pacific northwest are the subject of an extended article in a recent issue of the Saturday Evening Post. This attractive presentation of the fruit industry to about 5,000,000 people is a recognition much appreciated by Oregon and Washington.
