NEW WATCH INSPECTORS.

O. R. & N. Adopts New System of Inspection in La Grande.

The O. R. & N. company has posted notice there will be a new system of watch inspection, beginning the first of this year, and Siegrist & Co. has been given the position of inspectors for the line, extending from Huntington to Umatilla. This system will include a goodly number of railroad men who will be required to carry standard watches, which, under the old system, was not necessary. This will reduce to a minimum the chance of accident caused by defective time.

Under the new system watches will have to be inspected every two weeks, and a record kept of the number of seconds fast or slow. This record will be sent to the company, which will insure the proper repair of all railroad watches.
