### LIBERTY BELL.

#### Pendleton May Have Opportunity of Seeing Old Belle.

Pendleton will have an opportunity of having the old Liberty bell on display in this city while it is en route to the Seattle exposition, is the information the Tribune received from the Portland Rose Festival association officials. The city of Philadelphia has given its consent to have the historical relic shipped to the Pacific coast, and Pendleton has been asked to interest itself in having the bell routed on the cars through Pendleton and efforts must be made at once to have it placed on public view here for a day at least. These arrangements must be made long in advance so as to have the routing arranged in a satisfactory manner. The members of the Grand Army of the Republic, the members of the Commercial association, the public school officials, the officers of the city of Pendleton and others must get busy and take the matter up with the members of congress in Washington representing Oregon. The exhibition of the bell in this city would be the occasion for a grand patriotic demonstration, and attract many visitors to the city.—Pendleton Tribune.

### DYE STILL MISSING.

#### Kamela Haucher Who Disappeared Recently, Given Up for Dead.

Kamela, Jan. 9.—(Special).—All hope of finding William Dye, who early in December started for Pendleton and was last seen near here December 18, has been given up. Dye was seen at Pendleton on December 15, and on McKay creek near the Shuman ranch, on December 18. How he got there is not known, and where he went, or how he came to lose his life if such is the case, will perhaps remain a mystery, always. Searching parties of many kinds and at many times have traversed the country presumed to have been covered by Mr. Dye, but all without avail. There is no doubt in the minds of local people but that he is dead.
