## TRAIN HITS OPEN SWITCH

The Dalles, Jan. 11.—Train No. 5, westbound, hit an open switch at Deschutes, about 15 miles east of here, at 8:25 Sunday morning. The engine plunged into the ground about eight feet, but was not damaged much. The tender was badly smashed and the first mail car was thrown on its side and greatly damaged. The baggage cars left the track, but did not turn over. The rest of the cars did not leave the track.

Some of the passengers received hard jolts in the shake-up, but no one was injured. The conductor walked a mile and a half to a farm house and telephoned to The Dalles for the wrecker, which arrived in two hours. A track around the wreck was finished at 7 o'clock Sunday evening. The train crew was composed of Frank Weider, conductor; J. D. Gillian and W. C. Ayre, brakemen; George Ferguson, engineer, and J. E. Bennick, fireman. M. J. Buckley, general superintendent, and D. W. Campbell, superintendent, came with the wrecker from The Dalles. An engine was sent from Umatilla to haul the train back to Eligas.

The wreck was caused by the section boss leaving the switch open to thaw it out. He claimed that he had put a flag out and the engineer did not see it. The train had stopped at the tank to take water and was only running 16 miles an hour when they struck the switch. Had it not been for the stop at the tank the train would have hit the switch full speed and a bad wreck would have resulted.

## SLEIGHING EXCELLENT

Sleighting outfits are in great demand this week and the liverymen of the city have trouble in filling orders. Last evening there were at least a dozen turnouts that played tag with each other around the corners. Some ventured farther out in the valley and report good sleighing everywhere. It is seldom that excellent sleighing lasts as long as it has this week.  
It is still sufficiently cold to insure sleighing and profitable ice harvests, yet the mercury has not been forced to uncomfortable points. Since Sunday morning it has not touched the zero mark. More excellent winter weather than prevails today is difficult to imagine.
