ANIMALS SUFFERING

Pendleton, Jan. 11.—First reports of loss and suffering on account of the present storm are coming from the Umatilla Indian reservation. The well known improvident nature of the average Indian has caught him without much or any feed with the result that there will be more dead Indian cayuses than live ones, if the present cold weather continues for any great length of time. Cattle as well as horses are also suffering.

According to Ed Kidder, who came in yesterday from well up on the reservation, the conditions are even worse than it was thought. He says he counted three dead calves along the road and that one Indian woman has 100 head of horses without a particle of hay or grain for any of them.

Nate Rains is authority for the statement that many cattle belonging to Indians are starving to death on the reservation.

Indians seldom or ever lay in a supply of hay for the winter, allowing the animals to pick up what feed they can around straw stacks and rustle for their keep the best way they can. In ordinary winter conditions they can do this and the most of them pull through, but the present weather is unusual and unless the snow goes off and goes off soon, the Indians will be heavy losers.

Though the present storm has worked but little hardship thus far upon stock, it has not been so merciful to the coyotes, rabbits and other wild animals. During the past few days many stories have reached the city telling how rabbits have flocked around barnyards throughout the county, fearing civilization less than death from hunger and cold out upon the snow.

According to C. F. Daniel, who farms five miles northwest of the city, he found a number of rabbits about his barn yesterday. They had been driven in by the deep snow and sought refuge among the horses and other barnyard animals.

\$16,000 IN ASSESSMENT

RECEIVER STILL ENTERTAINS \$30,000 ASSESSMENT HOPES.

One and One-Third Assessment Due and as a Rule Collected—Receiver Has Nice Sum on Hand.

Up to date about \$16,000 have been collected by Receiver Niedner from shareholders in the defunct bank. In view of the fact that only one-third assessment has fallen due, this is very encouraging to all interested. Of course, in several instances, shareholders paid the entire assessment on December 19, when the first one-third of the assessment was due, but many others took advantage of the time allowed. About \$30,000 in assessments has been the fond hopes of the receiver throughout, and the probabilities are he will be successful in gathering up that amount.
