20-24 horse power in a car weighing  
but 1250 pounds, makes nearly two  
horse power to push every 100 pounds  
of car weight.

Wheel Base—100 inches, with 3 1/2-  
inch tires on the rear wheels. This is  
a larger tire than usually used on a  
machine of this weight and insures  
very little expense for tire repairs.

Lubrication—By an ingenious de-  
vice the whole power plant, transmis-  
sion differential, and rear axle is oiled  
automatically with no pumps to get  
out of fix and no small pipes to clog  
up.

Ignition—Perfect working magnets,  
built as a part of the machine, with  
no moving parts except the fly-wheel  
of the motor, and no intricate parts  
to get out of order.

Springs—Two transverse. The eas-  
est riding spring construction ever  
put under an automobile. This sounds
