### HINTS TO HOUSEWIVES.

- Save your left over coffee and tea and mix with your stove blacking. It will give a bright and lasting polish to your stove or range.
- Dry all your vegetable parings in the oven and use them for fuel.
- To keep milk sweet in hot weather, put it in a wide, shallow dish, and stir into it a teaspoon of saleratus to a gallon of milk, and place it where it will keep cool.
- To wash silk lace, make a good lather on your hands with a pure white soap and rub the lace gently till clean. Rinse in a little milk and water. Roll the lace around a large bottle. Fill the bottle with hot water and leave the lace until dry. It will not need ironing.
- A dish of water kept on the radiator will improve the air in a steam-heated room.
