Boise Solons Memorializing Congress.

Boise, Idaho, Jan. 13.—9 memorial congress protesting against any reduction in the tariff on lumber, coal, wool, lead ore and hides, was passed by the legislature here today. Five republicans voted with the democrats against the adoption of the memorial.

Big Prices for Wool.

Wool men of Baker, Grant and Union counties who happened to be in Baker City Saturday evening, were treated to a little surprise by Miles Lee, the pioneer sheep and wool man of this section, who buys as well as sells the product.

On the very heels of the National Woolgrowers meeting at Pocatello, there resolutions were being adopted favoring warehouses and many other things to raise the price of wool. Mr. Lee offered growers here 15 cents a pound for wool.

The surprise given wool men who received the offer had an effect of investigating conditions. Telegraphic advice from Boston to members of the association urges growers to hold their wool for higher prices than have been offered.

NEW MINING COMPANY

Articles of incorporation of the Big Creek Power and Mining company, have been filed in the county clerk's office according to the Blue Mountain Eagle. The incorporators are William Baker, Carney Rhodes and J. T. Hinker, with the main office in Pendleton. The capital stock is \$10,000 and is divided into 200 shares of the par value of \$100 each. The company proposes to engage in a general mining and power supply business and the articles enumerate the usual declarations of objects, aims and pursuits incident to corporations of like character.
