Assassination Averted.

Constantinople, Jan. 21.—Another effort to assassinate the sultan was frustrated by a letter addressed to the conspirator falling into the hands of Young Turks. The conspiracy was to overthrow the ruler, and involves 30,000 reactionaries. The object was to dissolve parliament and annul the constitution. The grand vizier and president of the chamber of deputies was also marked for death. A hundred arrests have been made.

Long Train Service.

Tacoma, Jan. 21.—The longest single train service in the United States will be inaugurated by the Great Northern, which on June 1 will begin operating through trains between Galveston, Texas, and Tacoma, according to advices received here. The trains will run via the Colorado Southern and other lines controlled by Hill, to Billings and Great Falls, Mont., thence over the main line of the Great Northern to Tacoma.
