was tried in Umatilla county last spring
on a charge of venue. He was found
guilty of the larceny of a span of
horses and given a three-year sentence
in the penitentiary. The case was ap-
pealed to the supreme court, which re-
cently upheld the lower court, and
Deal will now be taken to the peniten-
tiary without further delay.
