### IS OSTEOPATHY A FAD?

To consider the first part of the statement quoted to the effect that "Osteopathy is a fad," will seem for a moment a digression from our subject of prophecy. Yet one cannot look surely into the future without considering this point.

All fads rest upon a certain modicum of truth exaggerated by the enthusiasm of the beneficiaries of that partial truth. If we take an individual who has been suffering from some chronic ailment that defied the medical agencies of other methods and restore that body to normal ease and health, we must expect and pardon a slight exaggeration due to enthusiasm for the newly discovered agent of recovery. No wonder then minds untrained in the sciences pertaining to health and disease often expressed impetuously and even ludicrously the principles through which health was restored. And, since the practitioner often profited financially by this enthusiasm and exaggeration, we have an explanation of the fact that even the practitioners of osteopathy failed to give the public a correct and adequate exposition of the underlying principles of his profession. It may even be admitted without prejudice that in the development of a new system of scientific truth results are attained by the practitioner were often wrongly attributed to some impossible factor. Yet to say that all these sources of error exaggerated the truth of osteopathy into a fad is far from the mark as set today by the amount of actual good accomplished

by these principles.

The truth underlying osteopathy is two-fold: First, it may be stated that the body manufactures its own chemicals and compounds necessary for perfect function; second, that the best possible condition of the body for the accomplishment of this production is a perfect adjustment of its mechanical parts. Then osteopathic therapy looks first to the adjustment of the mechanical conditions of the body, after which one expects and attains a perfect chemical condition.

Recognizing the difficulty of mastering fully the mechanical relations of the body when considered in the light of their possible interference with chemical function, every school teaching osteopathy today demands of its students more actual work than is required by the medical schools represented by the American Medical Association. We give today a total of 30 months as compared with the requirements of 28 months in medical schools. In actual hours spent under the supervision and instruction of our professors we require more of our students than is required by any other profession on earth.

Surely the truth of osteopathy must be too broad and too deep to be the basis of a mere fad if to master this truth requires such instruction and such training for its attainment!—Dr. Meachar in Herald of Osteopathy.
