the oath of office and where Governor Magoon, the beneficent dictator of Uncle Sam, relinquished the cares and trials of government. Today's ceremonies marked the end of the second period of American intervention in the island, which began with the breaking out of the revolution in August, 1906, against the government of the late President Tomas Estrada Palma.

Tomorrow Magoon will sail for Washington, to render an account of his stewardship to President Roosevelt. For nearly two years he has ruled over the island as the head of the provisional government terminated today. That he has won the respect and admiration of the Cubans was abundantly manifested today, when he shared largely in the ovation, tendered the new president and vice-president.

He has not attended the sessions of the legislature since yesterday morning.

Norfolk, Va., Jan. 28.—Under the order of the court, the time in which states owning buildings on the Jamestown Exposition grounds have to take up the option contracts for the purchase of the sites upon which the buildings stand will expire tomorrow. The states are allowed 30 days from tomorrow to remove their buildings from the sites, if it is not desired to buy these.
