PIONEER CALLED HOME.

J. T. Ackles Died This Morning at the Hospital.

J. T. Ackles, one of the pioneers of the Pacific Northwest, and formerly a resident of this valley, died this morning at the age of 64 years, of cancer of the stomach.

The deceased made his home in southern Oregon for the past 20 years. Last April he went to Baker City, where he was taken ill and about 10 weeks ago he was brought to La Grande, the home of his brother, Geo. Ackles, where he could be cared for.

About five weeks ago Mr. and Mrs. Ackles became unable to give him proper care and placed him in the hospital, where he was given the best of attention. Following his instructions and desire, no funeral services will be held. Dr. Seemann will offer prayer at the grave. The interment will take place tomorrow at 10 o'clock in the Ackles cemetery, north of this city.

J. T. Ackles was never married. He leaves three sisters, two in Montana, one in Washington, and his brother here. For several years he owned a far ma few miles north of this city. He was always quiet, unpretentious, and his friends were only limited by his acquaintanceship.
