Pendleton, Jan. 28.—With but three days left in which to raise the remainder of the money needed for floating the woolen mill bonds the local soliciting committee has been actively at work today. Up to this afternoon the sum of \$20,000 has been signed up or was pledged. So it remains for the committee to raise \$10,000 more between now and Saturday.
