DIPHTHERIA ABOUT GONE

The Union Republican is advised by Chairman McIntosh, of the city board of health that the diphtheria situation has so far improved as to be very encouraging and everything now points to an early clearing up of the last case. It is the purpose of the city to see that every public building, as well as all private buildings where there has been sickness, are thoroughly fumigated and otherwise cleaned, to the end that every possible precaution be taken against further trouble along this line. The situation in and around Union has never been as bad as has been represented by some outside sources, and the general public may rest assured that no town was ever better cleaned up than will be Union following the few cases of sickness in this place. Just now, the plans of the city board of health contemplate starting schools and all meetings as per announcement February 8. At present diphtheria seems almost stamped out at Union and the situation is most encouraging.

PRISONERS CAPTURED.

Men Who Broke Jail at Vale Are Taken at Dell, Oregon.

C. A. Johns, Gus Johnson and Jim Lloyd, the three prisoners who broke jail at Vale Tuesday night, and then cut the wires leading from the city were captured today at Dell, south of Huntington near the Snake river, says the Herald. The criminals evidently stayed away from the beaten paths of travel and made their way northward from Vale through a rather sparsely settled country. The officers of the law soon got on their trail and they were caught at Dell.
