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A CRUCIFIXION MYTH

New York, Feb. 2.—That Jesus was crucified a mile away from Calvary of the Holy Sepulcher, and that he did not bear the cross as shown by scriptural accounts cited, are among the alleged discoveries made by John M. Gardner, prominent attorney and globe trotter, who has toured the world with his eyes open and has just published a book setting forth his experiences and the opinions derived therefrom.

Mr. Gardner has also visited the fields of the military prowess of Napoleon, whom he extols as a patriot, and makes the remarkable statement that but two headstones, one small marker and one monument have been erected to point out the more than 100 victories of the man who once held Europe in the hollow of his hand.

Mr. Gardner's work is the most notable contribution yet made to the latest New York society fad, the publication of souvenir books as gifts, and are not for sale to the general public. It is illustrated with many original pen drawings and sketches of scenes in Europe and the orient, and the book is elaborately bound.

A bill has been introduced in the lower house of congress to pass a law prohibiting the shipping of liquors into states that are dry or into any dry territory. If this bill becomes a federal law, the liquor forces will receive one of the hardest jolts that so far has been dealt them, and it will not only restrict liquor sales in dry territory, but it will make it much easier to secure the extension of the local option law.

HORSEMAN TRIED AGAIN

For the second time George Horseman is now on trial for the killing of Clarence McRoom at the Potts school house, nearly two years ago. The case was recalled in the circuit court this morning and the work of selecting a jury was immediately undertaken.

For the state District Attorney G. W. Phelps is being assisted this time by Judge R. A. Lowell. In the former trial he had the assistance of his former partner, John McCourt, now United States district attorney at Portland.

For the defense Judge James A. Fee and Col. J. H. Haley are again appearing.

At his first trial Horseman was found guilty of manslaughter, but on appeal to the supreme court the decision of Judge Bean was reversed and the case sent back for retrial. Under the law Horseman may not now be convicted of a graver crime than manslaughter.

COMMUNICATION.

To the Stockgrowers of Union County: Going to the bitter experience that I have just passed through, and knowing that there is to be a bill introduced during the present session of the legislature, which, if not amended, will deprive the stockmen of this county of the very best veterinary we have ever had. This bill unless amended, will deprive any veterinary from practicing his profession unless he is a graduate from some veterinary college. Without giving the matter anything more than a passing thought, one might think that this bill was drafted in the interests of the "dear" people, but behind it is a league of veterinaries who will reap the financial benefit.

The fact that a man has a diploma, especially from some of the so-called veterinary institutions that are dubbed colleges, permits a lot of impractical men to live off the public for a time at least, until their unfitness becomes general known among the men who take pride in raising good stock.

I am going to cite you to the experience that I have just passed through, which caused me a financial loss of quite \$1500. About the first of the year I noticed that several of my best horses were not thriving as they should and their decline was marked. I phoned for Dr. Charlton, the well known veterinary from La Grande, but owing to illness he was unable to come, and then I called another veterinary, who claims to have a diploma from the Ohio State university. He arrived, looked my horses over, one of which was dead at the time, and frankly told me he did not know what the ailment was. Nevertheless, he wrote out a prescription, mind you, not knowing what ailed them. I gave the horses the medicine prescribed, not knowing what else to do. My horses continued to grow worse and I once more called Dr. Charlton. When he arrived he found two of my horses dead, three on the barn floor that died the next night, and others, which he pronounced beyond recovery. Within a very few moments Dr. Charlton, in the presence of three witnesses, diagnosed the disease as cerebro spinal meningitis, and told me the condition of the feed that I was giving my horses was the primary cause. I caught the weight of his reasoning in a moment, for I had been feeding a very inferior quality of hay all winter. At one time I thought it so poor and worthless that I decided not to put it in the barn but one or two of my neighbors told me it would do to winter on and I put it up. Dr. Charlton told me this disease was not contagious and that in order for me to save my remaining stock would be to immediately change the feed together with a tonic preparation that he prescribed but the change of feed he assigned as the most essential. After Dr. Charlton's visit I only lost the three head which he told me were too far advanced to recover. Had he been able to have come when I first called him I would have lost but one horse instead of 19, and I feel that an injustice will be done to the stockmen of this county if we permit the legislature to pass the proposed law that will deprive us of the services of such a skilled veterinary and surgeon as Dr. Charlton, when I believe it is within
