San Francisco, Cal., Feb. 4.—Fear is entertained for the safety of the converted transport Buffalo, which is four days overdue. Hawaiian wireless reports were the last heard from the boat when she was two days at sea. There was an understanding that the Buffalo should remain within wireless communication excepting two days of the present voyage en route to San Francisco.

**Dinner for Count.**

New York, Feb. 4.—Count Johann Heinrich von Bernstorff, the new German ambassador to the United States, is the guest of the New York chamber of commerce this afternoon, and tonight will be the guest of honor at a dinner to be held at the Manhattan club by prominent German citizens of the metropolis.

In addressing the members of the chamber of commerce, Count Bernstorff declared the friendly feelings of the United States is reciprocated by the emperor of the German people. He referred to the unbroken friendship between the two countries. He said the commercial rivalry of the two nations has indicated peace. He continued by saying that "When the gates of commerce open, peace reigns."

**SENATE LESS ACTIVE.**

Nevada Anti-Japanese Sentiment Prevails in the Assembly.

Washington, D. C., Feb. 4.—Senator Dixon of Nevada, personally notified President Roosevelt today he had advised the Nevada senate he did not intend to pass the anti-Japanese resolution, which was passed by the assembly yesterday, unless it is materially modified. The measure is not the result of concerted action.

**STATE-WIDE PROHIBITION IN STATE OF TENNESSEE.**

Nashville, Feb. 4.—This afternoon the house passed over the governor's veto, by a vote of 59 to 27, the bill prohibiting the manufacture of liquor in Tennessee. The bill becomes operative on January 1, next year. The bill had already passed the senate. As a result January 1, 1910, Tennessee will enter into the list of states which prohibit the sale and manufacture of intoxicating liquors of all descriptions.

**Millionaire Lowry Dead.**

Minneapolis, Minn., Feb. 4.—Thomas F. Lowry, the millionaire railroad magnate, died here today, aged 66. He was president of the Twin City Rapid Transit, and the Minneapolis, St. Paul & Sault Ste Marie Railroad companies.

**Railroad Builder Succumbs.**

New York, Feb. 4.—Jose F. Navarro, builder of the first elevated railroad and constructor of the first modern apartment house, died today of heart trouble.

New York, Feb. 4.—With distinguished educators from their alma mater in attendance, the New York alumnae of Vassar college will hold their annual reunion and luncheon at Delmonico's tomorrow.

**Loeb for Port Collector.**

Washington, Feb. 4.—Roosevelt announced today that Loeb, his private secretary, will be the next collector of the Port of New York. It is understood Taft will nominate him directly after the inauguration.

**Express Train in Collision.**

Chicago, Ill., Feb. 4.—One man was killed and one seriously injured, and still another injured slightly in a collision between a switch engine of the Illinois Central and a suburban express train today.
