CARRYING THE HOBO

Intimation that some of the boys have been increasing their earnings by taking "hobo money" has resulted in the hauling onto the carpet of practically all of the 18 passenger brakemen on the Oregon division of the O. R. & N. Direct charges, it is said, have been made against a number of the brakemen by Superintendent Campbell, who has had the division picketed for some time with a whole swarm of the shrewdest railroad "spotters" in the country.

Information has leaked out that some of the boys who have been unjustly accused intend to resign rather than bear the stigma of having been branded as thieves and grafters without cause. The sweating of the employees under suspicion has been going on for some time, and it has resulted in a number of them seeking employment elsewhere.

It is charged that some of the brakemen have been making such a good thing out of it that the Harriman directors are jealous because their own dividends are so small in comparison.

Investigation in the present instance was inaugurated as a result of the influx of "globe-trotting" railroaders who blow into town and look for enough shekels to tide them over till they seek some new field. This class, when it secures a job as brakeman has nothing at stake, and picking up "hobo money" is about the easiest kind of graft in the world. The usual scale of fares which the "boes" are supposed to pass over to the "wheel squeezers" or "speed reducers," as the "brakies" are called, is \$1 for the division; short hauls are less. Freight and blind baggage are the same price, and instances have been found where the "boomer" brakeman have formed a conspiracy or combination with all sorts of "veggs," crooks and ordinary hobos, whereby any of the gang can get through on the particular run, and to give the countersign when the dollar is slipped to the brakie.

Some of the accused have not made any bones about taking this easy

money, and have hinted to Superintendent Campbell that it was a wonder all the boys didn't graft because the wages are so low. About the best money a passenger brakeman can make on the Harriman lines in the northwest is on the Southern Pacific, where the maximum is \$24 a month for 26 days of 10 hours each. The O. R. & N. scale is under that. The only penalty for taking "hobo money" is discharge.

Some of the brakemen who have appeared before Superintendent Campbell have informed him that no matter how closely they "work the train," either "on the fly" or "on siding," they can't keep the tramps off, especially when they have 50 or more to land at a time.—Portland Telegram.
