PORTLAND'S NEWS LETTER

Portland, Feb. 8.—(Special correspondence.)—Friday, February 19, exactly at 2 p. m., has been chosen as the date when the business men of Portland will talk to the pupils of the public schools upon the importance of their co-operating with the business interests in helping to increase the travel which will come as a result of the one-way colonist rates during the months of March and April.

The boys and girls in attendance upon the schools will be asked to write to their relatives, acquaintances and friends living in the older states, regarding these rates, and also to give their impressions of Oregon as they know it. Already a number of other cities and towns throughout Oregon have decided to adopt this date, and it is hoped that not less than 50,000 school boys and girls throughout the state may be induced to write letters, if they do, no one can estimate the value of this advertising vehicle, as the great majority of these letters will be read and re-read again and again.

Within the past week announcement has been made that in addition to the \$25 fare from Missouri river points, \$30.50 from St. Louis and \$33 from Chicago, a proportionate rate is good from every point in the United States. For instance, New York, 50; Boston, \$49.45; Cleveland, \$33.75; Birmingham, \$40.25, and Jacksonville, \$50.75, are given as illustrations.

The Portland Commercial club has now in the hands of the printers, leaflets giving facts about the city and state in addition to these rates, and these will be distributed at each and all of the schools. Samples of these leaflets are available to any reader of this paper. Oregon should get 30,000 new settlers during March and April.

Portland certainly gave a warm welcome and an enthusiastic entertainment to the 299 "Inland Empire" excursionists who spent Saturday in the metropolis. The party is under the auspices of the Spokane chamber of commerce, en route through Oregon and California. One of the most appreciated incidents was a package of stamped souvenir postals ready for use, presented to each guest by their hosts.

As a special committee from Burns-Harney county, Messrs. Wm. D. Hanley, J. W. Gowen and G. A. Smith will extend to the business men of Portland, at the Commercial club luncheon, Tuesday, February 9, an invitation to organize a great excursion early in the spring to visit Harney county.

The third Trans-Missouri Dry Farming congress will be held at Cheyenne, Wyo., February 23 to 25, inclusive, and Secretary John T. Burns of Cheyenne, urges the appointment of delegates by the commercial bodies, Development leagues, mayors and county judges of Oregon.

Vertebral Lesions.

Vertebral lesions are in themselves conditions of disease, having their causes, morbid anatomy and symptomatology, as do other affections. In addition, they are indirect causes of other affections, as all local affections may be. Many physicians fail to discriminate between the symptoms of a vertebral lesion and the effects of it. The common error is that of thinking of the lesion as a cause of disease and forgetting that it is also a condition of disease, and as such, has symptoms of its own. One does not speak of the intestinal ulceration, the enlarged spleen, the typical temperature curve, the rose spots, and the Widal reaction as effects of typhoid fever, but as symptoms and signs of it. In like manner one should not speak of the pain in the side, which exists in many lesions of the lumbar vertebrae as an effect of the lesion, but as a symptom of it. Failure to keep in mind the fact that lesions may have symptoms as well as effects and the common tendency to interpret the symptoms complained of by the patient as due to other affections of which the lesion is the assumed cause, hinders the increase of knowledge in both pathology and therapeutics.—Cosmopolitan Osteopathy.
