PECULIAR THEFT MADE

CANNED FRUIT, LARD AND BACON STOLEN AT NIGHT.

Thieves in Livery Rig Steal Fruits and Meats From E. W. Oliver Ranch, Near Island City—Track Team to La Grande Early Sunday Morning—Lard and Bacon.

Seventeen cans of fruit, five gallon buckets of lard, and some bacon were stolen from the E. W. Oliver ranch near Island City Saturday night, and to date only one ham of the stolen goods has been recovered. The only clue which the police and Mr. Oliver have to work with is that the theft was to all appearances made by someone who had hired a livery rig from La Grande.

Saturday night John Fairchild, who lives on the Oliver ranch, had spent the evening at the skating rink in this city, and on his way home met a livery rig near his headquarters, headed toward La Grande. A light drift of snow had fallen and when he reached home he saw that a rig of some description had turned in at the gate. Thinking Mr. Oliver had visited his ranch during the night, he paid little attention to the rig. Early Sunday morning Mr. Oliver at his city residence, apprised of the fact that no one of the Olivers had been out to the ranch, Mr. Fairchild grew suspicious and took an inventory. He was not long in finding the cellar molested. On account of the light snow, it was an easy matter to follow the tracks commenced at the Oliver ranch. Near Island City he found a piece of kum in a brush heap. Fortunately enough, no other teams had disturbed the tell-tale tracks and he had little difficulty in following his clue to La Grande, where it ended in a conglomeration of tracks.

No other articles than those enumerated are known to have been stolen, though further investigation may divulge additional loss.
