FAST BUNCH OF TOSSERS

Tutored by Physical Director J. O. Russell and under the management of S. H. the Weston Normal basketball team reached La Grande this morning and is quartered at the Sommer house today. They meet the M. I. A. team at the rink this evening, commencing at 8 o'clock sharp. The class in which the visitors are rated is best told by the close margin in the game with the Pendleton high school last evening, where the Normalites were defeated by one point in the last minute of play. The final score was 24 to 23 in favor of Pendleton. At the end of the first half, Pendleton led by one point, but during the second half the Normal players forged ahead until just a few minutes before the final whistle when Pendleton drew in the lead and almost with the whistle threw a field basket, giving them the required lead.

The members of the quintet are a husky looking proposition, and the locals will whip up a fast clip to keep abreast of them. Tired out as they are from a hard game last night and the tiresome trip across the mountains this morning, they have kept in the hotel nearly all day, except for a brief practice at the rink this afternoon.

BOARD IN SESSION

"Advertise in eastern papers" is the policy adopted last evening at a meeting of the Commercial club board of managers. A committee of three, William Miller, Fred G. Taylor and E. L.
