GRANT TURNER KILLED BY LOGS

BAKER COUNTY CORONER VISITS SCENE OF ACCIDENT

Presumed Well Known Baker County Resident Met Instant Death Yesterday Between Sumpter and Baker—Remains May Arrive in La Grande Tomorrow.

Grant Turner, brother of Don Turner of this city, and well known both in Baker and Union counties, was perhaps instantly killed some time yesterday at a point 15 miles from Baker City, on the road leading to Sumpter. It is presumed that death was instantaneous as he was badly crushed by a load of 30-foot logs he had been hauling to Sumpter for the Adams-Gardiner Lumber company. By profession, an employe of the forest department, he was now on a vacation and had accepted a position with the lumber company during the three months of his furlough.

Cold in death, the body was found last evening by parties from Sumpter. Coroner Called to Remains.

The coroner from Baker county was called to the scene of the fatal accident today, and at a late hour this afternoon had not returned. Telephone messages apprising local relatives of the accident, were received last evening and Oscar Jackson, a brother-in-law of the deceased went to Sumpter on No. 2 last night, arriving at Sumpter at noon today. Relatives here awaited anxiously definite details of the affair, but apparently there is little to learn, as no one saw the break of the binding chains, a fact which unquestionably caused the spread of the load and the crushing of the driver.

Widow in Nervous Collapse.
Stunned and suffering with nervous collapse, as the result of the sad fate meted out to her husband, Mrs. Grant Turner is in such a precarious condition that indications are she cannot leave her home until tomorrow. A telephone message from Mr. Jackson at Sumpter this afternoon, to relatives here, affirms that no attempt will be made to remove the remains to La Grande until tomorrow.

No funeral arrangements can be made until definite announcement comes as to the arrival of the body in La Grande.

The stricken family has the sympathy of a large host of friends in this city.

Grew to Manhood Here.
Grant Turner was born in Iowa, May 22, 1865, and when yet a mere boy came to Walla Walla with his parents and brothers. Soon after that the family moved to La Grande, where

Grant grew to manhood. In 1889 he married Miss Ella Jackson of this city. About 14 years ago Mr. and Mrs. Turner moved to Baker county, where they have made their home continually up to the time of his untimely death when the family was located at Sumpter.

Deceased is survived by a wife, a daughter, Miss Hazel, aged 17 years, and three brothers, George Turner of Wallace, Idaho; A. B. Turner of Portland, and Don Turner of South La Grande.

CONTRACT FOR SACKS.

Milton Tillers Engage 100,000 Grain Bags.

Members of the Milton organization of the Farmers' Educational and Co-operative union have signed contracts with the Kerr-Gifford company for 100,000 grain sacks to be delivered at Milton on or before harvest time.
