**\$75,000 IN HORSE FLESH**

**AUTOMOBILE WILL NEVER SUPPLANT THE HORSE HERE.**

County, Horse Breeding for Foreign Shipments is a Profitable One—35 Carloads in a Year, and Others Are Ready.

"Diversified Industries" is the slogan held up by Grande Ronde valley boosters as typical and applicable, but few realize when they make the statement, to what extent horse breeding is a profitable adjunct to the money-making interests of Union county. Set to thinking by a local item in The Observer a few days ago relative to the growing number of automobiles, one of the county horse owners who gives the matter study and attention, commenced to gather data as to the extent of the horse breeding for foreign shipment purposes, and the figures summed up are almost startling.

**35 Carloads in a Year.**  
During the past year, one out-of-the-county buyer has shipped out from Union county, 13 carloads of horses, another, 7 carloads, and others at various times and at lesser shipments, half of that number, making a total of 30 carloads. These average \$2000 per car at the lowest estimate. There are five carloads ready for shipment this week, which will bring the total shipments for the year to date to 35 carloads, or \$70,000 in cash remuneration to the breeders.

**Leave Other Money Here.**  
Buyers coming from all parts of the United States, as they do, have left snug sums of money, charged to expense accounts. One man here to buy horses, took away three carloads of hay. This may be used as an example of what all do, and several horsemen in consultation on the matter yesterday, agreed that during the year \$5000 had been dropped by horse buyers.

**Quality Goes With Quantity.**  
There is no disputing the fact that Grande Ronde valley turns out first-class animals. Buyers come from all corners of the country to secure horses here. Right now—today—there are eight buyers in Union county, and only one of them from the state; others are foreign to Oregon. The horse industry is rapidly becoming more and more profitable, and while the enemy of the horse in some localities—the automobile—is gaining a strong foothold, it will never supplant the horse for breeders find it too profitable a business to let go of.

**More Stock This Year.**  
During the time that these shipments have been going on others were being fattened for the market and are not counted in the total named in the foregoing. Among the men fattening animals for the market is Fred Gaskell. He has a carload of geldings that will tip the scales at an average of between 1500 and 1600 apiece. These will be shipped out tonight. Many others have from two to 10 head apiece along the same class, also ready for buyers this winter.

At this rate, Grande Ronde valley will soon become famous for its horse-flesh as for fruit, lumber, sugar beets, dairy and other branches of its long catalogue of industries.

**INDOOR TENNIS TONIGHT.**
