MINE TRAGEDY

The Baker City Democrat relates the following this morning:

"If I don't come out in 10 days come and find me," the last words of Chas. Hall, the well known miner and prospector who is missing from his claim in the neighborhood of the Baby McKee mine, in the Cable Cove district, and whose friends fear his death. They believe that he has become lost in the heavy snows of that region during the past two weeks, or has met with an accident in one of the tunnels on his property. Searching parties will be organized at Sumpter this morning and sent out to attempt his discovery.

Hall has not been seen for three weeks, when, after visiting his mother, Mrs. G. W. Hall in this city, he left for his mine, taking the train to Sumpter and staging thence with Byron Weatherford into Cable Cove district.

Hall parted company with the stage driver and started on snowshoes for his mine. "If I don't come out in 10 days come and find me," he called back to Weatherford as he started out over the snow.

The prospector failed to come out in 10 days, and the 10 days has dragged into three weeks, with no word from him. Yesterday a searching party left Sumpter for the mine, and found the man's cabin had not been occupied for at least two or more weeks. There were no signs of life about the place and friends fear that Hall never reached his cabin after parting with Weatherford.

Yesterday it was impossible to explore the tunnels of the mine, but that will be done today, and the parties will scour the entire countryside in the hope of locating the man at some other cabin among the hills.

Hall is a Baker county boy, and was born at Auburn during the early days of that famous camp. He is 45 years of age and all his life has been spent among the hills here. His mother is frantic over the tragedy forecast by his disappearance, and the blow falls upon her with double force owing to the loss of another son who was killed by a falling tree in that region a couple of years ago. The missing man also has two sisters in this city.

A REWARD FOR EVIDENCE

ANTI-SALOON LEAGUE IS AFTER ELGIN VIOLATORS.

Twenty-Five Dollar Reward Offered for Evidence of Bootlegging in Elgin—Subsequent Reward.

Offering a reward for evidence leading to the conviction of Elgin violators of the local option law, the anti-saloon league of Oregon has set a new precedent in this section of the state. Through the superintendent of the eastern Oregon district, E. F. Zimmerman, the law and order league has issued the following notice to the public:

A Reward.

Whereas, it is commonly reported that the local option law is being continuously violated in Elgin, and

Whereas, all good citizens should stand for the enforcement of the law which received the indorsement of the people at the ballot box; therefore be it known that the Anti-Saloon League of Oregon will pay the sum of \$25.00 for evidence that will lead to the arrest and conviction of any one selling intoxicating liquor in violation of the local option law in Elgin precincts.

The sum of \$25.00 will be paid for the first conviction in any case, and \$10.00 for the second conviction of the same party. Reward not to be paid until a plea of guilty has been entered or a jury has returned a verdict of conviction.
