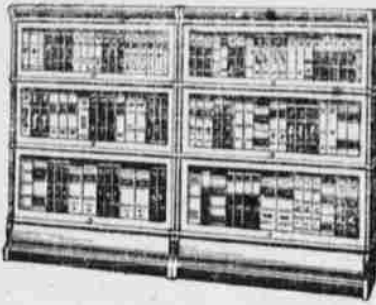

Escorting the remains were members of lodges and orders of which the deceased was a member, namely: The Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen, the Elks, Knights of Pythias and Knights of Columbus. At the church requiem mass for the dead was read. Interment took place in the Catholic cemetery.

The Pallbearers.

The pallbearers represented men of all the lodges in the cortege. The personnel is, P. J. Theisen, J. H. Peare, John Ormond, Lute Ferguson, Leonard Norton and W. E. Ferguson.

Turner's Funeral.

On account of having held the funeral services at Sumpter, the body of Grant Turner, killed near Sumpter early in the week, was taken by local members of the Knights of Pythias to the grave at the L. O. O. F. cemetery, where ritualistic services were held by the lodge. The escort of friends to the cemetery, despite the rain and mud, was large. The pallbearers were J. F. Campbell, G. M. Richey, W. W. Berry, C. C. Pennington, Dr. W. J. Riley and J. H. Keeney. He was a member of Granite lodge, but the local order, Red Cross No. 27, conducted the service. The widow is still in a critical condition, though she was able to attend the funeral.

his office he had never willingly planted a thorn in any man's bosom, and besought his supporters to study the incidents of the trial through which they were passing as philosophy from which to learn wisdom and not as wrongs to be avenged; ending with the solemn exhortation that, as the strife was over, all should reunite in a common effort to save their common country.

Lived in Terrible Age.

He lived in days that were great and terrible, when brother fought against brother for what each sincerely deemed to be the right. In a contest so grim the strong man who alone can carry it through are rarely able to do justice to the deep convictions of those with whom they grapple in mortal strife. At such times men see through a glass darkly; to only the rarest and loftiest spirits is vouchsafed that clear vision which gradually comes to all, even to the lesser, as the struggle fades into distance, and wounds are forgotten, and peace creeps back to the hearts that were hurt. But to Lincoln was given this supreme vision. He did not hate the man from whom he differed. Weakness was as foreign as wickedness to his strong, gentle nature; but his courage was of a quality so high that it needed no bolstering of dark passion. He saw clearly that the same high qualities, the same courage and willingness for self-sacrifice, and devotion to the right as it was given them to see the right, belonged both to the men of the north and to the men of the south. As the years roll by, and as all of us, who ever we dwell grow to feel an equal pride in the valor and self-devotion, alike of the man who wore the blue and the man who wore the gray, so this whole nation will grow to feel a peculiar sense of pride in the mightiest of the mighty men who measured the mighty days, the lover of his country and of all mankind, the man whose blood was shed for the union of his people and for the freedom of a race, Abraham Lincoln.

Celebrate at Springfield.

Springfield, Ill., Feb. 12.—Thousands arrived here early today to participate in the exercises throughout the day and evening in honor of the memory of Abraham Lincoln. The city is gaily bedecked with bunting and flags. Among the arrivals were Ambassador Jusserand of France; Senator Dolliver of Iowa, and a party of well-known officials. William Jennings Bryan and Ambassador Balfour of England, arrived in the private car of President Lincoln of the Pullman company. The meeting was presided over by Governor Deneen.
